



Readings: Acts 2. 41- end John 10. 1-10



Collect

Risen Christ, faithful shepherd of your Father's sheep: teach us to hear your voice and to follow your command, that all your people may be gathered into one flock, to the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Reflection on the Gospel Reading

The readings for this Sunday, in Acts and John, focus on living in God and with Christ as our guide and shepherd though all times. Good and bad, hard or easy. The Acts reading reminds us of the early church and how they shared resources. Is it better to be rich or poor? Jesus told a rich man to give away all his wealth. Does that apply to everyone? I hope not! I don't want to give all my possessions away, any more than you do. Jesus is challenging this man and us to what we own and where our loyalties are, if we make our possessions an idol and therefore treating them as what we trust in rather than our loyalty belonging to God alone. But if we treat our possessions as lent to us by our Heavenly Father, they can be a means of bringing others and us closer to God. What then do you own? If everything is lent to us from God then we should treat it with gratitude and respect. It then becomes a relief to remember that God want us to enjoy it all for a while, and in so doing we can be hospitable to those who are less well off. You don't have to give all your earnings to the poor or the church, but because we are grateful for what God has lent to us we want to give away a proportion each week to the church in thanksgiving and love for all that God has given us, both material and spiritual. In the Gospel reading Jesus refers to himself as the door of the sheepfold, the protector of his sheep, keeping the sheep safe in the fold and keeping the wild beasts out. By acting as the gatekeeper Jesus both encourages his sheep into the fold, the church, but also leads them out to roam and live freely in the world. So if the church is the fold, then perhaps we need to remember that its purpose is as a shelter to which we return to rest and recover. As we embark on our restoration work in church, we are reminded of our forebears who build the church, the thanksgiving and resource they offered, and those who followed who have maintained it. They were like the first disciples in the book of Acts and on whose legacy and hard work we enjoy this our faith. The first Christians, who by their commitment to spread the gospel message to every corner of the globe, brought to us the Christian faith we receive today reminding us that we follow a faith that could quite easily have stayed in the Middle East. So continue to give thanks to God for the gift of our faith and our building as we, our generation now leave a legacy for those who will come after us. As we continue to go in and out of the sheepfold the church, we have Jesus to guide us out to the places where we need to be and will gather us back in the church keeping us safe. If we hear his voice and go out and come back in through him, we will find our nourishment in the most unexpected places. Even now when all seems upside down and we can't see the future before us, we live in Hope, and know that when God is at work within and without us we begin to experience life as God intended. Amen.

Genealogical Research on Elizabeth Ann Rossitter – by Ina Penneyston

Elizabeth Ann Rossiter died on 10th January 1941 aged 74 Yrs at 11 Holborn St, Sudden, Rochdale Widow of William Rossiter during a bomb attack in WW2

Her death was registered March Quarter 1941 Reference Vol 8e Page 45

She had been born in 1866 registered March Quarter 1866 Rochdale to James Heywood and Mary Ann Heywood

MS Richardson

Her parents had been Married in 1863 at St Clements, Rochdale

On 1871 Census Elizabeth Ann Heywood was living with her Mother Mary Ann Heywood who was head of Household with Edith Heywood aged 1 Yr, Jane Richardson (sister to Mary Ann Heywood), and William Wild (Lodger)

Her Father James Heywood aged 45 Yrs had Died in 1870 Registered Rochdale 8e page 48
In Dec Quarter 1871 Mary Ann Heywood married William Wild at St Clements Rochdale
By 1881 they were living in Castleton and Elizabeth Ann Heywood was aged 13Yrs a Cotton Operative - Halftime
Elizabeth Ann Heywood married William Rossiter in 1888 at Rochdale Register Office or Registrar attended
She had 2 sons

James William Rossiter Born 1890 District Of Litherland Mother MS – Heywood Joseph Walter Rossitter born 1898 Registered Rochdale Sept Quarter 8e 54

James William Rossiter Married Edith Mary Roberts in 1910 at St Albans by Hartley Harrison Curate of St Aidan's They had a son Joseph William Rossiter born 1910 Registered Sept Quarter Rochdale Vol 82 Page 31 mothers MS Roberts

> On 1911 Census They are living at 1 Sydney St Sudden, Rochdale On 1939 Register they are living at Fern Bank 8 Barclyde St, Rochdale

> Joseph Walter Rossiter married Zaidee McCracken 1933 at St Aidan's

Elizabeth Ann Rossiter(a Civilian) Aged 74 Yrs died 10th January 1941 during ww2

She was buried 13th January 1941 in Grave Z3 No 37469 Heywood Cemetery where her Husband had been buried in 1936 William had been aged 72yrs at Death

Unfortunately there is no Gravestone but a marker with the Grave no on 37469
She is commemorated at Westminster Abbey on Plaque of Civilians died in the war
She is also Commemorated on War Memorial at St Aidan's Church Sudden Rochdale
