From the Vicarage: a reflection for the Third Sunday after Trinity

I hope you are all enjoying some of the nice weather and some time with your closer family and bubbles [now that won't make sense if someone reads this in 20 years time]

Jesus taught that the whole of Christian morality can be summed up in this: you must love God and love your neighbour as yourself. Full stop. Nice and easy???

World changing? No more rules or regulations, simple love, no more slavery to rules, just liberation. We're free.

Free to live happy and joyfully, guided only by the desire to do what's best for the people around us, and in thankfulness to God... And yet, and yet......!!!!!!

It's not easy. It's not easy living like this or living up to this? We read the Bible, knowing that it won't prescribe precisely what we should do in our present situation, but hoping we can find God's wisdom in scripture. We pray and ask friends for advice but then take what they say and turn it into a law for all time and we are back at the start again! It's so difficult to apply the law of love, that many don't try, and fall back on the legalism of 'thou shall not'. But as we hear from Saint Paul, he tells us that to live lovingly it can be more demanding than obeying the law. And none of us can earn our salvation, we are saved and we are free because of the gracious gift of God's love and God's forgiveness. In a word: Grace.

For sin will never have domination over us ever again, since we are under Grace and not law. So what does that mean for us today, this moment? First, it means don't condemn other people because they don't live up to our standards. You have no idea how difficult their lives may be, and they may be doing their level best to behave lovingly, and they might be doing even better than us - how do we know? Only God is the judge of that. Secondly, don't throw away your freedom and revert to a morality of inflexible rules and regulations that bind you to this world and not God's kingdom. Thirdly, set yourself the highest possible standard in applying the law of love, in every circumstance. That's the least we can do to show our gratitude to God for the free gift of his forgiveness and love, that love and forgiveness that to us is repeated and repeated, but to God is just standard and forever.

Believe and know that you are under the grace of love.

May God bless you and keep you and may God make his face shine upon you this day and every day, live in his love. Amen.





TEMPLE MOORE


Temple Moore (1856-1920), architect of St Aidan's: an article by Geoff Brandwood

30 June marks the centenary of the death of Temple Moore, one of the very greatest of all Victorian and Edwardian church architects. His output of some forty churches is greatly admired by architectural historians and those who love fine church buildings. His particular genius lay in interpreting the Gothic style for modern times and

which depended, not on the lavish treatment and colour as with much mid-Victorian architecture, but on what one contemporary writer called 'good proportion and sweetness of line'. For a masterclass in this approach one has only to spend a few quiet moments within St Aidan's.

Moore was educated in East Yorkshire and, after moving to London in 1875 to serve his articles under George Gilbert Scott junior, maintained close connections with the area, hence a large proportion of his work is found east of the Pennines. His largest and greatest church is St Wilfrid's in Harrogate begun in 1904 and finally completed under his son-in-law and successor in the 1930s. His Lancastrian work also includes St Anne's in Royton, a more complex building than St Aidan's and one that drew particular praise from Sir Nikolaus Pevsner. Writing of Moore's reinterpretation of Gothic there he said: here 'is an architectural polyphony which transforms historic precedents into something unprecedented.'


Moore is buried in London, not far from his home in Hampstead.

From the Vicar

Following the Government announcement that church buildings will be able to reopen for public worship from 4th July, providing physical distancing remains in place, the Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, who leads the **Church of England's Recovery Group**, said: "I welcome the Prime Minister's announcement today that we will soon be able to begin to meet and worship together in our church buildings again. "The last three months have been an extraordinary time - the first period without public worship and the sacraments in England in more than 800 years. There will be real joy as we begin to come together again – if even at a physical distance – but I also know that many will be understandably cautious at this news. "We will not be returning to normality overnight - this is the next step on a journey. We've been planning carefully, making detailed advice available for parishes to enable them to prepare to hold services when it is safe and practical to do so. It is important to say that the change in Government guidance is permissive, not prescriptive."
