# Worship at St Aidan's

#### Church of England advice on Holy Communion



Detailed instructions on 'consumables' suggest that services of Holy Communion can be held if specific guidance is followed, including the continued suspension of the Common Cup. At present, Communion should be administered **in one kind only** with no sharing of the common cup. The president alone should always take the wine, consuming all that has been consecrated; other communicants should receive the bread only, in the hand. As the Liturgical and Faith and Order Commissions have made clear, this is still 'complete communion'. See the full CofE guidance <u>here</u>

**Face Coverings:** In line with the advice of the Church of England, the Diocese of Manchester strongly advises that face coverings should be worn by all those attending a place of worship, including ministers, worshippers, staff, volunteers, contractors and visitors, where there may be other people present; remembering that they are mainly intended to protect other people, not the wearer, from coronavirus (COVID-19) and that they are not a replacement for social distancing and regular hand washing. <u>Advice document available here</u>

**Test and Trace:** Government guidance includes a request for names of attendees to be recorded and kept for 21 days to assist 'track and trace' if required.

#### Great Plague of 1665-1666 How did London respond to it?

This was the worst outbreak of plague in England since the Black Death of 1348. London lost roughly 15% of its population. While 68,596 deaths were recorded in the city, the true number was probably over 100,000. Other parts of the country also suffered.

The earliest cases of disease occurred in the spring of 1665 in a parish outside the city walls called St Giles-in-the-Fields. The death rate began to rise during the hot summer months and peaked in September when 7,165 Londoners died in one week.



Rats carried the fleas that caused the plague. They were attracted by city streets filled with rubbish and waste, especially in the poorest areas.

Those who could, including most doctors, lawyers and merchants, fled the city. Charles II and his courtiers left in July for Hampton Court and then Oxford. Parliament was postponed and had to sit in October at Oxford, the increase of the plague being so dreadful. Court cases were also moved from Westminster to Oxford.

The Lord Mayor and aldermen (town councillors) remained to enforce the King's orders to try and stop the spread of the disease. The poorest people remained in London with the rats and those people who had the plague. Watchmen locked and kept guard over infected houses. Parish officials provided food. Searchers looked for dead bodies and took them at night to plague pits for burial.

All trade with London and other plague towns was stopped. The Council of Scotland declared that the border with England would be closed. There were to be no fairs or trade with other countries. This meant many people lost their jobs – from servants to shoemakers to those who worked on the River Thames.

Does this all sound familiar? The Covid virus is not the first time the World has seen a pandemic. In public health terms today we are probably better placed to deal with it than were our ancestors but never the less it has still taken its toll in various ways particularly amongst the poorest and most vulnerable!

Great natural disasters have sometimes been attributed to God as a form of punishment – we perhaps only need to think of the devastating flood in Genesis or the Ten Plagues of Egypt in Exodus. These days we are perhaps more scientific in our approach as we look upon such disasters as the result of, for example, insanitary conditions. The insanitary conditions in London and outbreaks of cholera in the Nineteenth Century led to the development of the sewerage system and the introduction of clean water which brought about a long awaited improvement in public health.

Today's pandemic is perhaps more complex, never before experienced, it has provided something of a learning curve as scientists battle to learn more about it and how to best defeat it whilst politicians in the meantime struggle to contain it as best they can as the world continues to suffer great social upheaval whilst some countries fare better than others!

For the human race it is a salutary lesson in humility, that we are not invincible however technologically and scientifically advanced we think we are, that Creation is bigger than we are and as we continue to abuse it, it is still capable of delivering devastating punches!

I would not go so far as to say that we are at this time on the receiving end of God's punishment for our sins in relation to the world and how we conduct ourselves within it but rather it provides the world with an opportunity to stop, take stock, review the situation and consider how we might emerge from our present situation into a better and fairer world!
